Tidings from the East by way of the West



Brother James Garfield: A Brilliant Life Interrupted

When Brother James Abram Garfield's name is associated with Freemasonry it is most often under a banner of "Famous Masons", attributed to his service as the twentieth President of the United States. Assuredly, his "rags to riches" life of accomplishments is one all men

can admire. Being elected to the highest public office is no small feat but only scratches the surface of this remarkable Mason. I doubt very much that schools of this era spend any time discussing this remarkable man, except in reference to that thankfully tiny club of assassinated Presidents. He is the first and only President to have been elected directly from the House of Representatives.

By way of background, Bro. James was born into extreme poverty; the last President to be born in a log cabin. His father died early in his life and his older brother and sister sacrificed much to ensure James had a good education. It is written that his 13-year-old sister Mehitabel would carry a young James on her back through the snow to school. His mother would later donate a tract of their meager farm to build a local schoolhouse.

By most accounts Bro. James was an unusually gifted and accomplished student, especially in higher mathematics in which he was mostly self-taught until college. He was fluent in Latin and Greek as well as being ambidextrous. In fact, he would entertain friends by writing a statement simultaneously with one hand in Greek and the other in Latin. He studied the law as well and was admitted to the Bar in 1861 before receiving a commission as a Colonel in the Union Army. He used his aptitude in geometry to fashion representations of troops, companies, and other assets to teach the principles of tactics and maneuvers to fellow officers. A staunch Abolitionist, Bro. James would ultimately attain the rank of Brigadier General. Soon after the war, the "inexperienced" lawyer argued his very first case before the United States Supreme Court and won! Exparte Milligan (1866) is still considered a landmark decision in regarding individual due process rights.

At a young age he worked as a carpenter and showed a deftness at angles and mechanical fittings. In 1851, while attending a college preparatory school he fell in love with Geometry and wrote to the President of Williams college, Mark Hopkins, expressing an interest in attending. For his part Hopkins was very interested in admitting "sincere yet rustic" young men from the West to combat what he described as "signs of effeteness" in his normal students. Bro. James spoke fondly of the kindness of Hopkins in this pivotal moment of his life which was described by his classmate and fellow Brother John James Ingalls who said "The ideal college is Mark Hopkins on one end of a log with a student on the other,". Bro. James would go on to graduate Phi Beta Kappa and named class Salutatorian.










Bro. James' love of Geometry no doubt shared a symbiotic invigoration with his study of Masonry. Proof of this came in 1876 when Bro. James (then a member of the House of Representatives in the U.S. Congress) gave a speech at the Dartmouth College Chapel and arranged a private meeting afterwards with Professors Parker and Quimby of the mathematics department. In that meeting Bro. James produced an original mathematical proof of the Pythagorean Theorem he developed. The professors were so impressed with the proof that they helped get it published in the New England Journal of Education. Bro. James realized that if you construct a right triangle, and then flip it and rotate to make another congruent to it; you discover the mystery angle between the two is found to be 90 degrees! If you form a trapezoid from the two triangles and measure the area you get the Pythagorean Theorem (a²+b²=c²)! Quite an accomplishment for a mostly self-taught mathematician!



Interestingly, Garfield's clever proof was likely created the same year that Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone. Alexander Graham Bell has a similar story of impressive accomplishments in Life. Born in Edinburgh, Scotland in 1847 he showed a keen interest in the arts and sciences. At the age of 12 he invented a simple de-husking machine for a local mill. Little did either man know that their worldly pursuits had them destined to meet under the most unfavorable circumstances.

On July 2, 1881 Brother James was traveling to a 25th class reunion at Williams College from Washington D.C. when an evil and cowardly assassin drew a revolver and fired two shots into the back of the President of the United States. The motive arose in the fog of mental illness, a heart filled with darkness from a weak mind. The assassin believed he was owed a government appointment from the President for some meager campaigning. Bro. James was steadfast in his opposition to party patronage and corruption that had plagued the government for decades. This Post-Reconstruction period would not be marred by that stain of nepotism if Bro. James had anything to say about it. Men would rise upon their merit. A lesson no doubt validated by his time in lodge.



That day however, the demon sought his pound of flesh. The first bullet grazed Bro. James' right arm to which he reportedly shouted "My God! What is this?". The second bullet entered his lower back and felled him to the station floor. The assassin was quickly apprehended while Bro. James bled profusely on the floor. Over the next hour no less than ten physicians attended to the wounded President, probing unsuccessfully with their unsterilized fingers in a vain attempt to locate the bullet. It had lodged close to his pancreas and while it would be a survivable wound

today, the inability to extract it would eventually prove fatal.

Bro. James was rushed to the White House where the prodding and poking continued. The repeated probing caused severe inflammation and hemorrhaging. While Pasteur's "germ theory" was catching on in Europe, doctors in the United States were still largely unaware of the necessity for sterile instruments and fingers. Bro. James ultimately spent two bed-ridden months fighting off numerous infections as his strength continued to fade.

The news of the assassination attempt riled the nation and, particularly, the interest of Alexander Graham Bell. Newspapers had lamented the fact that the bullet could not be located and thus removed. Time was running out for the brilliant and honorable Mason. Bell began to work on the problem and developed the first ever metal detector, called induction balance. He experimented on sheep that he'd shot and found great success. Bell excitedly rushed to the White House with his new invention and a reputation of a brilliant inventor. Sadly, he experienced a number of unexplainable failures. Add to which, doctors only allowed him to search the right side of the President's body, mistakenly thinking the bullet must be there.

Mr. Bell tried and tried but his new invention experienced some kind of interference he couldn't explain. He could not have possibly know the reason behind the failure of his new invention. Historians have surmised that the President had been laying on another impressive invention...the spring-coiled mattress. The metal springs no doubt overwhelmed the sensitivity of the new detector with background noise and effectively hid the bullet from detection.

Bro. James Garfield spent only 200 days in Office when he finally passed in September. A brilliant life cut short by jealousy and vengeance. Looking back at his accomplishments, one has to wonder what could have been achieved from a life uninterrupted? A man of principle, a man of intellect. A statesman when others around him viewed government service as a means of enrichment. Such a man undoubtedly had much more to contribute. Could his Masonic heart and mathematical mind design a solution to the mess of Reconstruction? Sadly, we will never know. As Masons we know that there is much work to be done. That work takes men of discipline and honor. Progress does not dwell in the shadows of "what if", it is found in the fitting of stones. The work is before us, not behind. Bro. James may have said it best on thinking back to President Lincoln's assassination; he said "Assassination can no more be guarded against than death by lightning; and it is not best to worry about either." The best way to honor great men is to carry on with the work.
