### Tidings from the East by way of the West

### Hiram, King of Tyre



Every reader of the Old Testament is familiar with the story of how King Solomon, King Hiram of Tyre, and Hiram Abiff came together to build Solomon's Temple in 966 BC. That temple became an integral part of Freemasonry, providing everything from the layout of the lodge room with its pillars of Jachin and Boaz, to the rituals of craft

Masonry, Royal Arch, and higher degrees. Hiram provides not only many of the essential materials but also some of the laborers and, in particular, a Master-Craftsman who is skilled in forging brass. This craftsman is also skilled in the planning, designed and overseeing of the entire work. This craftsman's name is Hiram Abiff.

during the time of Kings David and Solomon as pointed out in the Jewish Tanakh and the Old Testament of the Rible

Solomon; for he had heard that they had anointed him king of the room of his father; for Hiram was ever a [great admirer] of David. And Solomon sent unto Hiram saying ... "I purpose to build an house unto the name of the LORD my God ... therefore command thou that they hew me cedar trees out of Lebanon ..." I Kings, 5:1-6

Plenty has been written about the life of the great King Solomon, and much has been told and speculated about the elusiveness of Hiram Abiff, but Hiram King of Tyre occupies very little space in the minds of most Freemasons today. Mentioned by name only in Masonic folklore, the King of Tyre disappears as quickly as he is mentioned in our ceremonies. What isn't as widely known is that he was also an ally of King David, Solomon's father. Hiram assisted David in the building of his palace in Jerusalem.

Since some people do not believe everything in the Bible is historical fact, it was reassuring to find a confirmation of Hiram's historical existence in the writings of Josephus.

Upon the death of Abibalus, his son Hirom took the kingdom. This king . . . joined the temple of Jupiter Olympius, which stood before in an island by itself, to the city, by raising a causeway between them. . . . They say further, that Solomon, when he was king of Jerusalem, sent problems to Hirom to be solved, and desired he would send others back for him to solve. . . .

Josephus, Contra Apionem 1:17

Not only was he a great character who played a significant role in the building of Solomon's Temple, but he also ruled over one of the most wealthiest and influential kingdoms in the Middle East. His many years of friendship with King Solomon and his father King David proved that he was worthy of our order of placing him of second Grand Master, symbolic of the Doric Column in that he was a true, generous, practical friend, represented by a plain and stocky strength.

Scholars believe that his name or variations of it meant "Exalted One", which in and around his lifetime (which would have been approximately 1000BC) was probably a fitting name for someone who was held in such high regard by his people. Unfortunately, more is known about his kingdom than of the man himself, but from the knowledge we have, it is possible to determine that a great deal of wealth, stature and power surrounded him.

His kingdom consisted, for the most part, two islands, one being the tiny island of Melkart and the other Tyre. Although Tyre was the larger of the two, it, in itself measured only approximately one mile long by three quarters of a mile wide, with both lying less than a mile from the shores of Lebanon, and due to them being virtually impregnable, they remained resistant to assaults and sieges for more than a thousand years.

Although his name is known to Freemasons as the King of Tyre, he was in fact the King of the Phoenicians whose ships spread their culture, knowledge and wealth far throughout the ancient world and established cities such as Cartage and Utica on the north coast of Africa. There are even stories of the Phoenicians sailing to England and extracting tin (a component of bronze), from various places including Cornwall. With the Phoenicians being skilled in the art of metal working, woven products, woodworking, stone working

and various other trades, it stands to reason that Solomon would choose such a king and his people to help him in achieving his goal of building a temple to the Lord God of the Hebrew nation.

Hiram's association with King David and his son Solomon was believed to be dictated by mutual need. Both the kings of Israel required skilled workmen and materials. David for his palace and Solomon for the temple to house the Arc of the Covenant, while Hiram required food, such as corn, wheat and oil for his people; therefore it seems logical that a deal was struck in order to exchange help from one another. The term of the agreement with King Solomon and his father can be found in the Book of Chronicles. Solomon paid Hiram 20,000 cors of crushed wheat, 20,000 cors of barley, 20,000 baths of wine and 20,000 baths of oil each year. Although today it is difficult to explain just how much was given to Hiram it is generally believed that it was in the region of between 880,000 and 1,720,000 gallons of wine and oil and about the same number of bushels of wheat and barley.

As time went on with the building of the temple Hiram lent Solomon vast amounts of money due to the increasing costs of the building work and, in exchange, Solomon gave Hiram 20 cities in the Province of Galilee. Unfortunately, when Hiram took a look at the cities that he was given he was not a very happy man. 1st Kings 9:10-14 states that Hiram quizzed Solomon "what kind of cities are these which you have given me my brother".

Perhaps Hiram had a right to complain as he did. In fact, he lent Solomon 120 talents of gold which in today's monetary value is roughly between 12 and 25 million pounds (using modern rate conversions that would be approximately between \$16.5 and \$34.39 million). Probably the greatest assistance Hiram gave Solomon was in fact the numerous skilled workmen who built the temple AND especially the famous Masonic master craftsman Hiram Abiff.

Nothing more is known about the great King except that his kingdom was to grow, flourish and influence other nations for about another six to seven hundred years until it was invaded by Alexander the Great in about 400BC. Needless to say, if it was not for the assistance and aid given by the king of Tyre to King Solomon then the King of Israel may not have been as important as he was.

On Saturday morning, September 23, Mike Moore PGM, Bill Hutchison, PM, and Brother Dave Schudel, all licensed Amateur Radio (HAM) Operators, assembled at the Estes Park Masonic Center for the third annual "Masonic Lodges On The Air" event. We contacted two other Lodges, Alpine No. 766 in Texas, and Chetek No. 277 in Wisconsin. During the event we made contacts with non-masonic radio stations on all four coasts, stations in Maine, Alberta, Canada, and Saskatchewan, Canada, and California. We heard stations in Spain and South America, but could not establish two-way contact. In addition, we did contact the Headquarters of the ARRL, American Radio Relay League, in Newington, Connecticut. We made contact on three different radio bands, 40, 20, and 10 meters. We didn't place high in scoring with only two Masonic contacts, but we did enjoy our time on the air. We are already making plans for next year's event.


