
Traditions vs. Habits

My Brothers, Colorado Freemasonry stands united in the bonds of our great fraternity, and today I want to discuss a crucial distinction that defines our very essence: the difference between traditions and habits. These terms are often used interchangeably, yet understanding their unique roles is paramount to our success and the longevity of our brotherhood.

Traditions are the sacred practices and beliefs passed down through generations, laden with profound meaning and purpose. They are the bedrock of our Masonic identity, shaping our journey and guiding



But in stark contrast to tradition are habits. Habits often masquerade as traditions within the life of a Lodge. Over time, they become so ingrained in our culture that we mistake them for tradition. In conversations with Masons across our jurisdiction, it is clear that 'the way we've always done it' is not only failing but driving away our younger members. Is it any wonder that so few candidates complete all three degrees when we prioritize mundane tasks over meaningful





















discourse? Albert Einstein once said, "The definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over, and expecting a different result." Attracting and retaining the next generation of Masons requires us to put our philosophy into action. We must transcend the mundane and embrace our true purpose – making good men into better men. Educational sessions, discussions on Masonic philosophy, mentorship, and opportunities for personal development are the pillars of our fraternity, not the mere reading of minutes.

In a world where interpersonal connections and face-to-face interactions are rapidly being replaced by the superficiality of social media, Masonic fellowship stands apart. This is our strength. So, my brethren, let us strive to provide more meaningful engagement for our members. Let us strengthen the bonds of brotherhood through shared experiences, mutual support, and genuine fellowship, to foster a sense of belonging and camaraderie.

Brethren.

It has come to the attention of the Grand Lodge office that several lodges have lost their Nonprofit status by failing to file their 990's with the IRS. There are reasons to believe that some of those lodges identified are in good standing with the IRS, and this false negative has been caused by a bad EIN number being filed at the Grand Lodge office. Some of the lodges identified have provided proof that they are in good standing. Section 68E of the Colorado Book of Constitution requires every lodge to forward a copy of their filing sent receipt to the Grand Lodge by 15 June each year. I am asking that they also include an accurate EIN and if unable to provide a copy of your filing sent receipt, then a status on where you are in recovering, your Nonprofit status. Please assist the Grand Lodge office in collecting this very important information.

To assist those lodges that have lost their Nonprofit status I have assembled a team to assist lodges in answering questions and directing them in the process to get their status back. The following individuals have agreed to answer questions that come up and advise those lodges working to get their status back. Please be courteous and patient when working with these Worshipful Brothers and remember they are Volunteers. They have agreed to assist the Craft and need our upmost respect for their efforts.

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California to Colorado (A personal look at Masonry)

One of my favorite things in Freemasonry is to visit or travel to other lodges. Not just for the fellowship but to watch and learn how they do their ritual work. Even in the same districts there are differences caused by, traditions, different Officers, coaches, or simply by Accident

I have been to many different lodges in different counties, states and countries, and have not seen any two the same. Actually...there are variations that happen within the same lodge. Ok, we're human and make mistakes but what I mean is there are many different ways our work is accomplished.

I won't speak specifically about the many differences in ritual. But I would like to mention the differences in how we do it, learn it and qualify for offices. And there are many differences between Colorado and California. First, Colorado is Ancient Free and Accept Masons (AF&AM) and California is Free and Accepted Masons (F&AM), which would naturally have differences.

Some of these are "Traditions" and some are "Ritual". In California, opening the lodge, they do a Jewel March instead of presenting the Tiler with the implement of his office. A Jewel March is where the Master presents each officers the Jewel of his office, as they walk around the floor in front of him.

Differences between the two Jurisdictions:

- The Marshall interviews the candidate in the first degree, not Senior Deacon
- Knocks on the door. By hand in California and by Rod in Colorado
- Opening of the Bible is a random placement in California, not to a specific Chapter or Verse.
- Standing on the level when closing. This shows to even the youngest Entered Apprentice, we all stand as equals, California doesn't have this in their ritual.
- Saying of Psalms 133, in California this First Degree only
- California pass is only collected on second degree only
- Qualification of a Candidate, California there is a timeframe before getting an application.

California to Colorado (A personal look at Masonry cont.)

Can be as long as 6 months in California, where the Prospect must attend Stated Dinners, Coffee and Donuts or other public meetings. He must show his dedication or desire to be a Mason. Once, he receives his application the top line signer usually, becomes his Coach. During the 6 months is when his background check and other requirements are accomplished.

- Coaching of the Candidate, coaching is the responsibility of the Senior Warden in California.
 He assigns coaches, watches the progress of a candidate, ensures the coach has had the
 proper classes to be a coach and is the go-to person if they have questions, or if the Candidate or coach has questions about anything in his particular degree or handbook. Also the
 Candidate takes a written test before proceeding to the next degree in California and is interviewed by the Past Masters after taking that exam.
- After closing the first degree the Candidate receives a Lodge Walkabout, where he is introduced to the furnishing of the Lodge. I have seen this done in Colorado twice, but only after the charge has been read.
- Mandatory California Officer qualifications; Senior Deacon must a able to give the staircase lecture, Junior Warden must be able to give the entire First Degree as Master, Senior Warden the Second Degree and Master all three Degrees.
- In California, the Senior Deacon is Not allowed to touch the candidate at the altar. So, foot placement, due Guard and signs are taught by the coach later.
- Meals before stated meetings/communications. A Stated Meeting (Communication) has a
 meal before. Not just refreshments but a full meal, usually provided by one of the youth
 organizations. Cost each diner/member about \$20. The meal is public for family members
 and prospects. Or anyone who wants to be there. During the meal announcements are
 made to shorten the time in the meeting, of course, only those for the public.
- California's Grand Communications is a three day event and the budget is decided at that time. California also has Masters and Wardens retreats, to train the incoming Masters and Wardens and also Secretary/Treasurer Retreats for training as well.

California to Colorado (A personal look at Masonry cont.)

• Candidate Interviews, In Colorado this is open and all three interveners attend the interview with the prospective candidate at the same time. This really threw me when I was asked to do an interview, and asked to perform it in the open, in front of everybody. California requires the interview of the prospect be done in secret and that each interviewer do their own separate interviews with the Candidate.

Different rules and actions in BoC & Bylaws of course...there is an availability to look up any California Mason on their Grand Lodge website and it has a dues card on it you can print or for the Tiler to look at if need be.

There are many more differences I could discuss such as; Officers Coaches, District Inspectors, How to practice are performed and scheduled.

I find even though there are many differences between these jurisdictions in how the work is accomplished, and how different it sounds, the meaning is the same. We act and live it in same manner...

For truly we are all on the level

Final Roll Call Honors—Fort Logan National Cemetery

On Tuesday, June 25 the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 1071 held a "Final Roll Call Honors Committal Program" at Fort Logan National Cemetery. This beautiful ceremony was held as a final tribute and interment of the cremains of four veterans.

These men all served their country during the Vietnam War. Their cremains had not been claimed by their families or loved ones after their deaths and were being held at the Arapahoe County Coroner's Office. The VVA, working with the Coroner's Office, Olingers Mortuary and Fort Logan National Cemetery to give these men the proper burial they deserved.

This was the third Honors Burial conducted this year by the VVA. Fourteen veterans were honored on April 16, another 13 on April 30 and then four today. These ceremonies are always respectful and meaningful. The gun salute, the bugler playing "Taps", the solemn march with each veteran's remains being held by a fellow veteran, the Honor Guard from the American Legion Freedom Riders all make you proud to be an American.

Freemasons share a long history of serving our nation and many Masons are veterans. Several of us have been working with the VVA and are proud to participate. We are honored and humbled to help say "Fair winds and following seas" to these veterans. The Honors Burials are always open and visitors are welcome to attend.

Membership Awareness and Retention

Greetings Worshipful Masters, Officers, and Brothers:

As 2024 begins and we look to Freemasonry through the lens of membership, awareness, and retention, I wonder how many of our lodges are actively engaged in membership, awareness, and retention in their lodges and in the local communities?

I would like to hear from the lodge representatives on what they are doing to promote the craft from membership to awareness in their lodges and community at large. What are the various ways that you maintain the members' awareness and interest of the craft? What local programs do you have in place to expand your membership locally?

One program for consideration for 2024 is the creation of a Craft Warden position or appointee and I bet that some of the lodges already have a similar position in place, but I would also like to know if that is the case for those that do and those that do not.

The concept of the Craft Warden would be to address the above membership and awareness activities inside the individual lodges and build an interface between the lodges and membership & awareness and the GL district lecturer. The Craft Warden would be responsible for local membership & awareness activities for your lodge and allowing for a larger base of ideas and exchange of information between the GL committee and the lodges. The position could encompass things like holding and scheduling local training and presentations for your lodge as educational, awareness, retention type material, candidate open houses or even scheduling digital meetings based on approved content and format as an open meeting.

A coordinator for any and all membership and awareness, and retention for the members and prospects for your lodge and local area but focusing on membership and awareness. By nature, the responsibilities of the Craft Warden and membership/

awareness committee and GL District Lecturer will cross over into the education committee arena where the Craft Warden would find online content for various presentations, educational materials and more from the members login from the education portal.



Honor Flight

From the Grand Commandery of Colorado

Rocky Mountain Honor Flight is a Denver Colorado-based non-profit organization formed in 2007. Our goal is to fly every able and willing Veteran to Washington D.C. to visit the monuments and memorials dedicated to their service. Our priority is

with World War II and terminally ill Veterans. We also accept applications from all Veterans. We are a member of Honor Flight Network, which began this activity in 2005 and began flying with commercial charter aircraft in 2006 from Dayton, Ohio. There are now about 130 "hubs", from which flights originate around the country. National Honor Flight Network provides us with logistical support as well as arranging activities in Washington D.C.

Veterans must fill out an application form, which can be found on our application page https://rockymountainhonorflight.org/ and printed or downloaded. Trained volunteer guardians accompany all Veterans on each flight. Volunteers can apply to be a guardian by downloading or printing the form available here. Various private and commercial donors support us. We are supported by many Veterans' organizations in the region. We have no paid staff. Our volunteers organize the Veterans for travel, arrange the travel both to and from Washington, and arrange all transportation, activities and meals in Washington. The "journey" is usually 3 days and 2 nights, spending several hours at the World War II Memorial, and visiting other Washington landmarks such as the Korean War Memorial, Vietnam Wall, Lincoln Memorial, Arlington

National Cemetery and changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns and the Marine Corps War Memorial.

At the current time, for obvious reasons, priority is given to World War II Veterans. If a Veteran is certified terminally ill by a doctor but able to travel, he or she moves up the priority list no matter what their era of service. We hope to launch at least four flights per year and perhaps more, providing we get enough financial support.

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


